"Slava Ukraini! Heroyam slava", which means "Glory to Ukraine – Glory to the heroes." A chant for the Ukrainian people that stems back to the Ukraine war of Independence over a century ago and has become synonymous with Ukraine's pride. It is still used to this day and demonstrates this unique country's well-preserved culture and traditions.

My fellow resident and close friend, Maria Moch, who immigrated to the United Sates in 1955 from the Ukraine at the age of 5 with her family, carries great pride for her country and continues to hold onto the "old ways" from



their homeland. She truly lives Ukraine's core values: honor, loyalty, faith, education and respect for elderly.

It was here in the States, at her mother's side, Maria learned many of her family's Ukrainian traditions which she continues to preserve in her home today. Maria learned not only to sew, cook, bake, paint, crochet, knit, garden but to also create her beautiful Ukrainian Easter Eggs which she shared with our community this past April. These eggs are referred to as Placko in the Ukraine, which is a derivative of Placek meaning cake, hence a metonymic occupational name closely related to pastry chef.

Maria also enjoys expressing herself through her art which ranges from painting portraits of her beloved grandchildren to life-like, colorful landscapes of the grounds at Heath Village. In addition to creating her artwork, Maria speaks several languages, is an outstanding cook and gardener. Her garden is always prolific with vegetables and flowers which she always generously shares with the community at the Heath Village Farmers Market. Maria finds it very rewarding to know that all the proceeds from the market go directly to the Heath Village Friendship Fund.

I have seen how utterly selfless Maria is taking care of her 97-year-old father. She always remains positive and is truly a renaissance woman, a mentor, and my friend. She epitomizes the Ukrainian strength, the same strength, sadly, we are seeing on display every day by the Ukrainian people during this difficult time in Maria's homeland. We are blessed to have her as part of our Heath Village family.

Senior Hall of Fame Inductees: Octavia Brown & Bob Jones

It is with great pride that Heath Village Retirement Community announces the induction of residents Octavia Brown and Bob Jones into the Hackettstown Area Senior Hall of Fame. "Tavia" and Bob, along with their fellow honorees, were recently recognized during a celebration luncheon and induction ceremony.

The Senior Hall of Fame was established in 1997 to recognize senior citizens in the Northwest New Jersey region who have made a significant impact on the lives of others in the community.

Bob Jones has spent most of his life making his community stronger and helping those around him live happier more fulfilling lives. He was a high school teacher in Chester for 31 years. He and his wife Helen moved to Heath Village in 2014. Upon his arrival, he jumped in headfirst getting involved as a Heath Village Ambassador & Greeter. He has also been a Friendship Center Pen Pal and volunteer. The children love taking their annual summer walk through the Heath Village garden with "Mr. Bob." As the coordinator of our Community Garden for more than six years, he works with the residents to ensure that this wonderful community resource remains beautiful and well maintained. During this past winter, he collaborated with the Director of Grounds to have additional raised garden beds installed so that residents who were finding a traditional bed difficult to maintain could continue to enjoy gardening.

In addition to his busy life at Heath Village, Bob has been an active member of the 50+ Club of Chester for 28 years, where he served as President and held a variety of other leadership roles. He is a former Deacon & Elder of the local Community Presbyterian Church.

Originally from Gladstone, Tavia has only been a village resident for one year, but during this brief time, she has already made an impact on our community by sharing her amazing history and experiences with our residents. It is for her leadership, however, in founding and developing the equine therapeutic industry for which she was inducted into the Hall of Fame.

Beginning, more than 50 years ago, Tavia founded Mane Stream, formerly Somerset Hills Handicapped Riding Center located in Oldwick, NJ. Simultaneously, she also founded the Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship International (PATH). Tavia was also a Professor of Equine Studies at Centenary University for more

than 23 years and this year was the recipient of the Gold Dome Award from Centenary University. The EQUUS Foundation also honored her with their prestigious Humanitarian Award this past January. Both awards recognized Tavia's unprecedented role in the growth of therapeutic equine studies.

On behalf of everyone at Heath Village, I would like to congratulate Bob and Tavia for their induction into the Senior Area Hall of Fame and thank them for their contributions to our community.

In Memory of Many, In Honor of All Heath Village's Memorial Day Ceremony

I am a member of Rolling Thunder Chapter 3NJ. It is a non- profit organization who advocates for Prisoners of War and the Missing in Action (POW/MIA). They also coordinate many programs and events to benefit veterans. When I started working at Heath Village, I was eager to plan new Activities. Once I realized that there wasn't a formal program established for Memorial Day, I decided to make it my mission to honor our veterans and POW/MIAs by educating our residents about the history of Memorial Day.

After months of planning, I decided to organize a yearly Memorial Day Ceremony. My agenda was to include guest speakers and historical facts on various subject matters centered around Memorial Day. Last year the



focus was animals in wartime. This year's topic was Arlington Cemetery. It included the history of how and when the cemetery came to be, the many memorials located within it and information on who is buried there.

I wanted to get the residents involved in the event and decided to coordinate a group of residents to handmake poppy flowers to represent each man, women or animal who gave their life in war. By doing this, we would be able to bring a visual awareness to the cost of our freedom, which is something I believe needs to be acknowledged and never forgotten. Last year, our Poppy Volunteers created 450 poppies which we secured to a fabric banner that is used as a backdrop in our main display. This banner is meant to represent a field of poppies which we refer to as *The Wall of Remembrance*. This year, I am very proud to share that the Poppy Volunteers added fifteen dozen additional poppies to our *Wall of Remembrance*.

Some of the poppies were attached to pins and are available for purchase. All the monies raised will be donated to the Friendship Fund. At this time, we are pleased to share that we raised \$150.00. We still have some available. We encourage you to stop by Activities to purchase one.

Our Mayflower residents also contributed this year by creating miniature poppy flowers out of crepe paper which were used for a table display in our Heath House lobby.

I want to take this opportunity to thank all my resident volunteers. There is a lot that happens behind the scenes to make this event and ceremony possible. I would never be able to accomplish it without their support and assistance each year.






